## Ten Minute T(ea) with Ms. Marjorie Young

- Q) How would you characterize the relationship between students and faculty at Deerfield?
- A) I've been here for four years, and I've noticed a lot of close relationships, and I think that's because our relationships with students are multifaceted. We can be their advisor, their teacher, their coach, and we can be their dorm resident. I think it gives us an opportunity to see students from different perspectives throughout the course of the day. We can see them playing on the field, in a play performing, in the dorm. It's really nice to be able to interact with students in so many different ways.
- Q) Have you seen the dynamic of that relationship change over the course of your time here?
- A) For me, it's changed because the first year, you're trying to figure it out. This is my fourth year, and I feel more comfortable and confident in those relationships with students. I think the first year I was really timid, and I was trying to figure out what it really meant to be a dorm resident. So for me, it's changed. I can only speak for myself, but from what I've observed, I appreciate that relationship more, and I've gotten more comfortable in each of those roles.
- Q) Do you think that relationship plays an important role in the Deerfield experience?
- A) Absolutely. I'm thinking about my relationship with people at sit-down. I'm not really great with names, so this year, I decided I was going to try to learn everyone's name, starting with my sit-down. When I see them, I say their name and try to make a connection with them, and I think that's very helpful. I do think it makes Deerfield special, and it builds and promotes the community we are trying to live in. I haven't worked at a boarding school before. I worked at Princeton University before, and I had good relationships with students, but they weren't as strong as the relationships I have here.
- Q) Does Deerfield help promote student-teacher relationships?
- A) I would say so. I would say it's really interesting because throughout the course of the day, I interact with many students in meetings or at lunch, and I go to the games. I think there are a lot of ways that we facilitate that, even if you are not a classroom teacher. Even though I'm not teaching, I still feel the bond that adults and students have.
